TALES FROM BEYOND.

Mr. Charles Wright of the Mistletoe Hotel, one of the oldest publicans in Victoria died Friday last and was interred in the Moorooduc Cemetery on the following Tuesday.


So says the *Argus* of June 12th 1903. Charles Wright a music hall entertainer and entrepreneur arrived in Melbourne in the 1860s, the time of the Gold Rush and the money was flowing. He quickly became part of the pub and entertainment scene and was the owner of the Mistletoe Hotel, McKenzie Street Melbourne from 1870. Although holding more than one license was illegal he also ran the Colosseum in Bourke Street where “patrons danced all night.” He also had an interest in the Melbourne Gin Palace.

Charles amassed a huge fortune and upon his death in 1903 his will stated that 50 Pounds was to be spent on a tombstone over his grave at Moorooduc Cemetery, 60 Pounds was to be spent on a memorial window at St. Columb’s Church Hawthorn. There was a bequest to his daughter of 1000 Pounds, but the bulk of his wealth was left to charity. The estate was to be divided and invested and interest to be paid half-yearly for the many charities and hospitals listed. The real estate in Mornington was to be leased and the money to be paid to the treasurer of the Mornington Shire Council for the relief of the poor of Mornington and Hastings. Although there was an unhappy letter to the editor in 1906 whose author claimed that, since the establishment of the so-called Charles Wright Fund for the Poor,” I have not heard of one person in Hastings who has benefited to the extent of one shilling. All the poor of Hastings have received are fresh air and sympathy. Mr. Wright may as well have taken them with him.”

Due to the cost of fencing and the new State Land Tax the properties were sold, the money invested and the interest put in the care of the Mornington Shire Council for the relief of the poor. These payments continued until 1940.

The former Mistletoe Hotel was the site of an archaeological dig earlier this year when 250,000 artefacts dating back to Melbourne’s earliest days were uncovered.
