

LESLIE MOORHEAD LECTURE

Lorraine Smith Journey of a lost Manuscript.

Lorraine and her husband ran a bookshop in Warrnambool and this is the story of an unpublished manuscript found. The research took her overseas

When an old parchment was found inside a copy of 'Alice in Wonderland' in a second-hand bookshop, everything about it was a mystery. Discovered to be an Elizabethan manuscript on vellum, this is the enthralling story of its travels from a hamlet in Yorkshire in 1583 to Warrnambool in 2013.



Port Phillip Bay Shipping

Shipping on Port Phillip initially started with the transportation of cargo or for taking those populating the area, to and from the little growing settlements. Fish and building materials, trees and lime for mortar in particular.

Little jetties such as Mills Jetty (below) serviced these vessels with row boats or lighters used to negotiate the shallows.



The first part of the Mornington Pier was built after a petition was sent to the Colonial Government by the residents and business people. Building of the pier started in 1857. The mail was carried by boat in the early days of the township.

Thomas Cogger Allchin owned *Governor La Trobe* and the *Maggie*. He built *Sutton Grange* with the tower so he could watch to meet them arriving at the pier. Allchin had won a contract to supply sleepers for the Geelong Railway and firewood for the barracks of a military regiment located in Melbourne. He also brought goods for the general store he and his wife Sarah owned in Main Street.

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Schnapper Point (Mornington) and the Mornington Peninsula was becoming more populated by the new settlers particularly following the discovery of gold. The Government had land surveyed for sale as these newly arrived needed places to establish themselves.

As the access to the Peninsula was still faster by water than the rudimentary roads and tracks, travel by boat was still needed and growing. Many early entrepreneurs like George Coppin seized on the potential tourist travel. He purchased land in the 1870s and took Sorrento from a small fishing and lime burning village to a larger township. Hotels were built to accommodate the burgeoning tourist trade and Coppin's tramway from the front beach to the back beach was a highlight. This was all dependent on the paddle steamer transport. The steamers left Melbourne stopping at Mornington, occasionally Dromana, Sorrento and then across to Queenscliff and return.


Many of the vessels were built in Scotland and took the journey to Melbourne before plying their trade on Port Phillip Bay and beyond.

PS.Williams

The *Williams* was put onto the Port Phillip Bay tourist route in 1872. She was a iron built vessel powered by both sail and paddle steam with two funnels and two masts. Her other duties were as a tugboat.

The competition for the tourist trade grew and an Auckland built *Golden Crown* was put into service in 1874 by a newly formed shipping company, The Sorrento & Queenscliff Steam Navigation Co.





The *Edina* pictured here had many years of service on the Bay and beyond. She had been chosen to meet the Duke of Edinburgh when he arrived in 1866. She took a boatload of distinguished guests to the Heads in a flotilla to meet his ship the HMAS *Galatea*. She was eventually purchased by the Howard Smith company and when she finished in 1938, she had served for sixty-five years, having carried over 2 million passengers.

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
In 1890 when the *Ozone* commenced its service, there were seven other steamers vying for the tourist trade. Melbourne had been named Smelbourne and the lure of the clean salt air and the various Baths built around the bay made an opportunity for travellers to leave an increasingly dirty city. At one time two steamers had tied up at Mornington disgorging two thousand people.

Many of the big businesses gave their staff a picnic holiday at Mornington, Sorrento or Queenscliff. Businesses like the Railways, the Post Office and butchers' picnics.

With the larger steamers such as *Weeroona*, the building of the north arm of the Mornington Pier was needed.

Storms were frequent and damaging to the pier and the north arm was finally left only as posts under the water after a storm in the late 1930s.





Ozone 1886, Hygeia 1890 and Weeroona commenced service in 1911.

The Second World War, rail, buses and road travel put an end to a 'Trip Down the Bay' by paddle steamer. The old steamers which couldn't be sold off for other purposes ended their days blown up and sunk in the ship's graveyard outside the Heads. The *Ozone* ended as a breakwater at Indented Head and at low tide, some of it can still be seen.
