

Afterwards we can go to the Dava for coffee and/or lunch. More details in February newsletter.



Moorooduc Quarry

This 25 hectare Reserve lies within the National Trust Recorded Landscape Unit, "Mount Eliza South East Face".

At its highest point the Reserve provides one of the best views from Mount Eliza across the plains to Western Port.

Early in the 1850s lime burners stripped the land of much of the timber, notably the casuarina species to fuel their lime ovens.

The quarry is believed to have been started in 1887 by a David Munro who used the stone for ballasting railway lines in the district. Rock at the quarry was blasted with explosives, then loaded by hand into horse-drawn "Dobbin carts".

The rock was then taken to the steam-powered crusher located about halfway down the hill, loaded into larger carts and transported by rail to the Frankston-Mornington rail line.

In 1923 the Frankston-Hastings Shire Council purchased the site and commenced quarrying, using the stone for decorative building work, road making, railway line ballasting, and repairs to the Mornington Reservoir.

In 1927 electricity replaced the steam crusher and from 1935 the cartage of stone by rail was replaced by trucks. This form of cartage continued until the closure of the quarry in 1961 when the quarry floor began to fill with water.

With the closure of the quarry, the lake filled and became a popular swimming spot.

Action by concerned local groups resulted in Frankston Council designating the area a Flora and Fauna Reserve in 1973. It was progressively fenced and closed to all by pedestrian traffic.

Brian, the gardener at Heronswood took us on a garden tour telling us the history of the property, the many varied and wonderful trees and plants, companion planting, heritage seed preservation and insect interaction. Many of us felt we could have listened all day!

Those of us who had been at the coffee morning where John Hedley spoke about slate roofing took particular note of Heronswood roof which John has repaired. So interesting to hear that this slate arrived as ships ballast. How clever and practical were our early settlers!!

We enjoyed a superb lunch in the old home that featured produce from the garden.

After lunch we headed to McCrae Homestead where three knowledgeable and experienced volunteers gave us a great tour of the old Homestead and visitors centre.

For members of our Historical group who have not visited these sites recently it is well worth the short trip to enjoy the history that has been so wonderfully preserved for us all.

We plan to have the next bus trip at the end of Feb/early March.
