



SCANNING DAY

We have been able to add to our collection, copies of items brought in on the day. Some were family history items such as from the Downward and Burch/Pentecost families. We also now have more pictures of Tasma Court and Main Street in the 1960s. Many thanks to those who permitted us to copy their items and a big thankyou to Murray Adams and Val for being there all day to do the work.

THE MORNINGTON BATHS [see pictures p. 7]

I was helping on the research team for our new publication that Vicky has put together "Heritage Esplanade Walk" and I was fascinated with some interesting facts I discovered about the Mornington Baths and the habits of the day.

Early reports tell of "Mr. Irvine's Royal Baths erected in 1892 and situated in a secluded position and within easy distance from the township. The bath's enclosure is all that can be desired and without contradiction it may be claimed as one of the most complete outside the city, surrounded with a substantial fence of hard wood, thoroughly shark proof and containing 30 to 40 bathing boxes with soft wood flooring makes it most comfortable for bathers."

Between 1902 and 1905 Cr. Cornford proposed to the Mornington Shire Council that a bylaw be adopted enforcing the compulsory wearing of bathing costumes at the Mornington Baths. This motion was consistently rejected and opposed on the grounds that it would be an infringement of the liberty and rights of the people using the baths. It would also harm tourism as the wearing of bathing costumes was not compulsory at any other baths on the Bay

Cr. Cornford was supported in his motion by Cr. Stephens who contended that: "Costumes should be worn. It was shameful to see the bathers; he would not say they were Mornington people, going along the spring board!" The motion was finally passed in December 1905.

I also found that originally sea bathing was something that one did for one's health. It was thought that salt penetrating the pores of the skin was beneficial; the more skin exposed the better. Until 1917 open sea bathing was illegal and the sexes were strictly confined to separate bath houses. High walls ensured that women were not exposed to the sight of male bathers who it seems in accordance with the practice of the day, took to the waters naked. Strict codes on the wearing of bathers were introduced by councils as mixed bathing became increasingly accepted. After all the years romping around naked, the times had changed and it was not until 1938 that men were officially allowed to bare their chests on Victorian beaches.

HERITAGE MATTERS


It is that time of year again when Mornington Peninsula Heritage Awards take place. This year we hope to enter the Mornington Primary School renovation and the work done at The Currawong Community Centre.

The Primary School needed extensive work due to neglect over the past years despite the tremendous efforts made by Mario Vitale and his dedicated staff. This has been completed in a sensitive fashion thus retaining the school's heritage. Even though the school doesn't have a heritage overlay, an oversight in the original heritage study, this should be rectified in the new study which comes to council in the near future.

The Currawong Community Centre also had extensive work done, again in the manner of the original building. The building was re-opened last year by David Morris MP. It is now well used and forms a useful addition to community activities such as U3A.

At the time of writing I am waiting for information from the school project managers and the architects involved with Currawong. As soon as this is received our submissions can be completed.

Bus Trip to ANZCA Museum and Historic Iron Houses

On Tuesday 26th February, we went on the first of our two bus trips for this year. Our morning destination was the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists in St. Kilda Road.

After a long trip through rain and flooding roads we finally arrived. We had a guided tour of the lovely old St. Kilda mansion *Ulimaroa*, built in 1889, and an entertaining lecture by two retired anaesthetists, and a visit to the Geoffrey Kaye Museum of Anaesthetic History on the College's fifth floor. This Museum is one of only three in the world of similar collection size and standing.

The bus then took us to South Melbourne for lunch then on to the three National Trust Portable Iron Houses in Coventry Street. These were brought out from England around 1855 to accommodate some of the thousands of fortune hunters who arrived in Melbourne following the discovery of gold. The houses, occupied by people such as civil servants, builders, and business men, were shipped in wooden crates, the wood then being used as lining and partition walls for the corrugated iron outer walls and roofs. Canvas, newspaper and wallpaper were used as wall covering. Everything was provided to erect the houses – bolts, screws, floorboards, spouting, cast iron casement windows, fireplaces. A six-roomed house was about 60 pounds, smaller sizes were 30 pounds. Cooking was generally done in an outside add-on kitchen. We also had an interesting tour of the nearby streets.

Note. *Ulimaroa* was an interpretation of the name given by Maoris to "a land-mass a months' canoe-trip away", as recorded in a 1773 account of Captain Cook's first Pacific voyage. At the house *Ulimaroa* is a 1795 map by German cartographer Friedrich Cantzler showing Australia connected to Tasmania, the landmass titled "Ulimaroa oder Neu-Holland".

Also note, *Ulimaroa* was probably designed by Leonard John Flannagan, a Mornington architect who lived on Beleura Hill and who designed the original fire station in Main Street, among other buildings.
