

RESEARCH

A short time ago we were contacted by Noelle Jones regarding the architect Leonard Flannagan. She was researching his work for the Melbourne Tramway Museum. We gave her access to the research papers by Maureen Tregonning on Mr. Flannagan's time in Mornington.

Leonard Flannagan moved to Bath Street Mornington and became a valuable member of the community. He served on the Mornington Council for a number of years and was Shire President in 1918. He was also on the Foreshore Committee and the Mornington Progress Association. All of this while maintaining his architectural practice in Melbourne. He designed the Mornington Fire Brigade building which the Country Fire Brigade used as the prototype for brigade buildings throughout Victoria. He designed the Railway Store for J. Hall on the corner of Bath and Main Streets, and also designed a number of Mornington's houses.

Noelle found that although Leonard only spent ten years designing for the Tramways Board, he left a large legacy of buildings, particularly the tram shelters which can still be seen. If you go to http://hawthorntramdepot.org.au/papers/flannagan. htm you can see the paper Noelle has produced about our Leonard Flannagan. When Joy and Peter Last visited the Somme earlier this year, they were moved by this poem. You may have heard *In Flanders Fields* read in Mornington on Remembrance Day, but since this year is the 100th Anniversary of the Great War, we publish it here for you to read:

> In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.
