PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Our volunteers day was well attended. I think our members appreciated seeing things which are normally locked away in cupboards, which we are unable to put on show for any length of time. Thanks to those of you who offered to help. We have one display cleaned up and our clothing collection is being checked and reorganised.

We are currently talking to the Shire Council to have four more plaques placed in strategic locations. One in Mornington Park to tell the story of the building of the archways during the 1930s Depression, one at the Toy Library, one at the Courthouse to highlight its involvement after the Football Disaster and one in Mt. Eliza to inform people of this accident on Pelican Reef.

We are again opening all day on Australia Day from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m, with activities similar to last year. Perhaps you can spare a couple of hours to help us as we get a large number of visitors and we spill out onto the grassed area. We need to prepare a duty roster for day on a two-hour rotation.

We have employed a cleaner to clean the inside of the Museum. We are no longer able to climb ladders and the fans and lights needed a good going over, not to mention the cobwebs which had built up over winter. We would like to recommend the work of Ana Smith and her team at First Class Cleaning. The Mornington Peninsula Local History Network (our association of volunteer history groups on the Peninsula) has gained funding for a travelling exhibition centred on a postcard from each society's collection. Our postcard is the centrepiece for a story on the railway and its closure.

The Network has also received funding to have oral histories professionally conducted with some of our older long-time residents. We are limited to two or three sessions at this stage, but we hope this project will be able to receive more funding so that we can have more histories secured for the future.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Because the Post Office Building is 150 years old this yearwe are reproducing this official history from the Public Relations Section of the Post Master General's Department, Royal Mail House, 255 Bourke Street Melbourne, dated 1973. This is the continuation of an extract from a letter to a Miss Carroll.

Telephone facilities were provided about 1910 and by 1912 there were nine subscribers. These were as follows

No.1.	Grand	Hotel	 L.	Η	arrison

No.2. W.A. Korner.....Real Estate and Stock Agent

No.3. Royal Hotel......Mrs. E. O'Gorman

No.4. David Tait.....Pharmacist

No.5. Dr. Somers......Albert Street

No.6. Mr. J. Doherty.....Butcher Main Street

No.7. Kirkpatricks Hotel......Mrs. Murphy

No.8. Dr. Zichy- Woinarski......Wolfdene

No.9. Mr. G. McArthur...... Holcomb House Esplanade

The exchange was converted from manual to automatic in 1956 and by 30th June that year the new automatic exchange was serving 809 subscribers. There were 2498 subscribers as at the 30th June 1972. This represents all the information available at this office. I hope you will find it of interest.

P.S. I omitted to mention that a new Post Office was provided at Mornington on 2/3/1964. It cost \$57,814 to build. It was erected on land acquired by the department on 13/9/1951 with a frontage of approx. 68 feet to Main Street, a depth of 229 feet and rear frontage boundary to Railway Parade of approx 66 feet. A small portion of this land was later sold.

(This is where our current Post Office stands today. Although telephone numbers have become larger, the last digit on the Grand Hotel's number is still Number 1.)
