

The Genesis of the Mornington Peninsula Historical Society 60 years on

(now known as the Mornington & District Historical Society Inc.)

In the 1960s and 70s Australian history became very popular with academic study and many books being written about Australian History by Professor AGL Shaw, Professor Manning Clarke and Michael Cannon's many histories. Bush Bands became the music we all danced to and Professor Weston Bate championed local history.

The Royal Historical Society, understanding that it was a long journey for people to travel to Melbourne encouraged the setting up of regional history groups. Ours was the South Eastern Historical Association. But what was needed was even more local historical groups to tell the stories of the local area. Mornington wanted to tell its own story and so Leslie Moorhead and a group of other people interested in the history of the Mornington Shire started meeting in the library. They did a lot of work researching and then sharing this amongst the members through visits to historic places and talks, given on the information which had been found. Over the years we have placed some of this research with our fellow Mornington Peninsula Historical Societies. One great collection was that undertaken by Vera Mills who did research on all of the schools on the Peninsula. Vera was a primary teacher, hence her interest.

Of course, when the Commonwealth Government was going to sell the old Post Office, Leslie and others lobbied to have the building given to the community for a now much needed Museum. The idea of the area having an Historical Society prompted the citizens to clean out their cupboards and offer the Society many many historic items. The committee's spare rooms had become overflowing with these things, including the book Joy writes about. Now we have the Old Post Office Museum, Mornington thanks to them.



The Shepheards Calender

An important function of the M&DHS is to receive, store and display historical items of local interest. A cataloguing team of volunteers works at The Old Post Office Museum to catalogue items. Val, who is our Archivist, is responsible for the overall collection, and registers and sorts incoming items, Edna catalogues historical documents under Archives, Maureen catalogues Images such as photos and drawings, while Joy catalogues books under Library. Currently, a further category, Objects, is lacking a volunteer. Our scanner keeps our database up-to-date, scanning and entering new items, and basically keeping us functioning. Some decisions about items are straightforward, others are complex. One of the most complex items we have considered is *The Shepheards Calender*.

In 1973, a Mornington resident, Arthur Darby, donated The Shepheards Calender, by the Renaissance poet, Edmund Spenser, to the Mornington Historical Society. Darby was an engraver who stated that his grandfather had purchased the volume at Sothebys in London, in 1868; his wife Fairlie Darby attended the Society's events. As a rare book, it would have been of undoubted interest to Society's members, but as it was it was outside the new Society's focus on local history it primarily remained in safe storage, in the Old Post Office's safe. It gained the attention of the cataloguing team who returned to their cataloguing tasks following the Shire's painting of the inside of




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the museum, after the COVID lock-downs. First, we had to unpack all the items that had been removed for the painting team. Edna discovered The Shepheards Calender in one of the book boxes. I searched for information about the book and entered its details on the File-maker program used by M&DHS for cataloguing museum items, and Val searched for Arthur Darby's background. The book was in reasonable condition with some damage to the spine, and leeching of ink in the images. Aware that we had neither the resources nor the expertise to undertake restoration, the Committee agreed to offer it to one of Melbourne's research institutions with expertise in rare books. The State Library of Victoria (SLV) with its strong reputation for its displays of rare books was delighted to accept the volume and enthusiastic about undertaking its restoration. I had the privilege of taking the book to the SLV and was fortunate to view the Rare Books section where restoration work was undertaken. The SLV provided a signed Donation form for the Society's records that is now included in Archives, with other records pertaining to Spenser's life and work.

The Shepheardes Calender was originally published in 1579 and carried the sub-title: Containing twelve eclogues, Proportionable to the twelve monthes of the year. Eclogues were pastoral poems, cast as pastoral dialogues, adopted in the 10 eclogues of the Roman poet Virgil, and the earlier idylls of the Greek poet Theocritus. Use of archaic language in Spenser's works suggests a connection to medieval literature. Spelling differs in subsequent editions of his works, e.g, Shepheards vs Shepheardes, Calender vs Calendar. Each eclogue is preceded by a woodcut followed by an explanatory Argument. A short Glosse is also included after each eclogue for the exposition of "olde words and harder phrases". The January eclogue introduces Colin Clout, a shepherd's boy who complains of his unfortunate love for Rosamund. The December eclogue ends with a complaint of Colin to the god Pan, comparing his life to the four seasons of the year. While cast as pastoral dialogues, some eclogues include political and societal nuances, presumably based on Spenser's work and personal life.

Following Spenser's death in 1599 several collections of his work were produced. The 1617 publication donated to the M&DHS comprises collected works of Spenser, excluding his most famous work, *The Faerie Queen. The Shepheards Calender* is followed by examples of Spenser's work, e.g. Letter to Sir Walter Raleigh; a pastoral elegiac on the death of the knight, Sir Philip Sidney; Colin Clouts come home againe; sonnets e.g. Amoretti, and Epithalamion; and Fovre Hymnes. It was printed in 1617 by Bar: Alsop for John Harrison the Elder, Paternoster Road, London.

Edmund Spenser, was born c.1552, the son of a farmer, who was educated at a Grammar School, and Cambridge University where he was awarded a Master's degree. As a man of letters he obtained positions with government officials, most notably as secretary to the new Lord Secretary of Ireland, Lord Arthur Grey, whom he accompanied to Ireland. He subsequently obtained a land grant, Kilcolman, in Munster where he commenced the The Faerie Queen. He was encouraged by Sir Walter Raleigh, whose Irish estate was close to Spenser's, to return to England to present the first three books from the *The* Faerie Queen to Queen Elizabeth 1. The final three books were presented to the Queen following the loss of his Irish estate as a result of the Munster Uprisings. The Queen awarded Spenser a small lifetime allowance, After he died he was interred at Westminster Abbey. He is remembered as the preeminent poet of the Renaissance era. To the M&DHS cataloguing team, Arthur and Fairlie Darby's inscription on the inner cover of the book, "We feel sure some people appreciate old volumes" has been exemplified in our journey with The Shepheards Calender.
